It is intended to support local authority and judicial decision-makers to develop a shared understanding of research and make decisions that lead to stable and positive placements for children and young people. Child neglect and its relationship to sexual harm and abuse: responding effectively to children's needs (open access)	Evidence Scope and Executive Summary	This series of open access evidence scopes considers the potential relationship between neglect and forms of sexual harm and abuse: child sexual exploitation; intra-familial child sexual abuse; and harmful sexual behaviours. This second edition briefing highlights emerging evidence on understanding and building attachment relationships pre-birth. It provides a fundamental grounding in attachment theory and different attachment behaviours, with a focus on identifying signs of parent-child interactions that may need further assessment. It also aims to build understanding of attachment and the appropriate application of the theory in direct work with children, young people and families. Attachment: understanding and supporting parent/ carer bonding_ before birth and in infancy	Frontline Chart	Parental mental illness, domestic abuse and drug and alcohol misuse correlate highly with parents' experiences of abuse, neglect and attachment disorganisation in childhood. Such a background presents a risk of maltreatment and neglect of a parent's own children but is not predictive; 70 to 80 per cent of parents who were maltreated as children will not repeat maltreatment and there are many opportunities to change or ameliorate indicative behaviour pre-birth and in the early years. Whilst there is no suggestion that all children of parents who misuse substances are automatically going to experience developmental problems, this type of behaviour can affect the extent to which children's needs, across the developmental domain, are met.
